Hills identifies its improvement priorities

Widening 12 Mile, Orchard Lake and Haggerty reads and Northwestern Highway are some of the suggested county thoroughfare improvements that Farmington Hills officials would like undertaken immediately.

The suggestions are among a list of eight proposed projects included in a recent letter from Mayor Jan Dolan to Oakland County Road Commission Managing Director John Grubba. The letter accompanied a road commission-sisted questionnafte designed to determine communities' road improvement needs.

improvements on the county's road sys-tem in Farmington Hills and the grow-ing decline and quality of life in our city because of inadequate roads," Do-lan wrote.

"In fact, we have determined that our most critical and pressing problem is that of improving our major road system and finding the necessary fiscal resources that will permit us to undertake needed improvement projects," she continued

Pupils' scores slightly higher

Farmington Public Schools students showed a slight overall improvement, with one exception, in 1985 state-mandated achievement tests given annually to all Michigan fourth-, seventh- and 10th-graders.

to all Michigan touries, sevenies and of the graders showed a two percentage point decline in math scores on the Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAR) evaluation, where math and reading skills are tested. Results show a percentage of students passing at least 75 percent of objectives on each test A pupil must answer two of three questions

correctly to pass an objective.

Math objective total 28 for each grade and include fractions, proportions and geometry. Reading objectives number from 23 to 25 and include vocabulary, comprehension and critical reading.

21 81 were tested during the last week of September and first week of October. Results for southeast Michigan school district were recently released, with statewide results to follow.

LOOKING AT a four-year trend, fourth-grade scores tocreased nice percentage points and 10th-grade scores five points, which MEAP District Coordinator Connie Mason considers a "large increase." Middle school scores remained "level" — within one to two polots.

remained level" — within one to two points.

Coordinator for five years, Mason was previously Eagle Elementary reading specialist where she worked with MEAP scores. She is currently Farmington's coordinator for gifted programming.

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
