McDonald, who tentatively plans to retire from teaching in June, coached the highly successful Stevenson girls team for 20 years. She led the Spartians to four runner-up finishes in Class A, the latest being Saturday's state finals in East Lansing. "I don't need first place," McDonald said. IN 1979, she became the first woman to win the Matt Mann Award, a state-wide honor for service. McDonald has also been nominated in 1985 for Coach-of-the-Year by the National High
