Founded in 1970, Common Ground helps almost 20,000 individuals each year through its crisis intervention services, weekly medical and legal clinics and alternatives programs. Seventy-one percent of the agency's service users reach Common Ground through the crisis telephone unit, 23 percent utilize face to face counseling and 6 percent use the TTY telephone system for the hearing impaired.

Common Ground also sponsors the annual Art-in-the-Park fine art show held each fall in downtown Birmingham's Shain Park.

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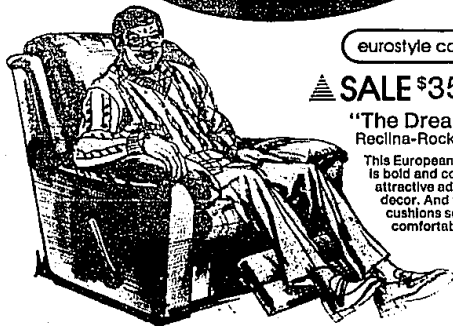
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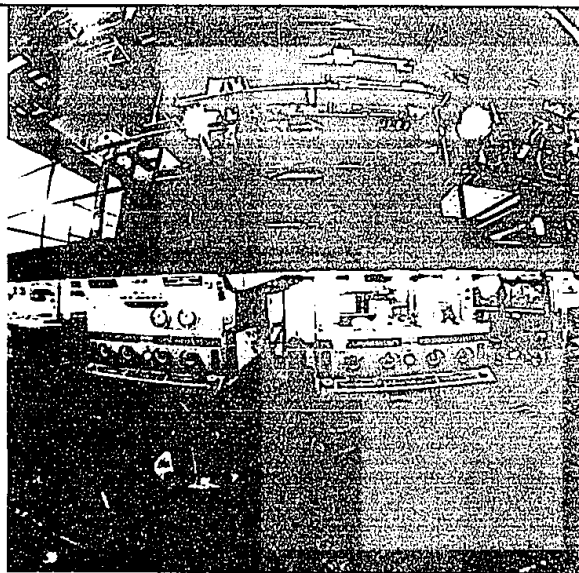
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
