

Sparrows: 2 look alike but are different

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FRIENDS and neighbors who see an unfamillar bird in their yard often ask me if I can identify the species they saw.
Though I try to visualize what they are describing and compare it with birds seen in our
area, I'm afraid my success rate for identification is very low.
In order to identify a bird from a verbal description, it is important to know approximateity how large the bird is by comparing it to enmon, well-known species.
Any information on habitat or habits can be
helpful also. Most importantly though, what
unique color patterns or field marks did the
bird possess.

LAST AUTUMN, a few people described see-ing a sparrow-like bird on the ground in their bushes. With a white stripe down the center of its head.

Even with a brief description such as this I fait very confident that my friends were seeing either white-throated sparrows or white-crowned sparrows.

The species are closely related. Both have a prominent white stripe down the top of their head and one across the side of their face above the eye.

These cousins of the bird world appear alike at first, but after closer examination their differences become apparent.

HINTE-CHOWNED Sparrows, as their name implies, have both the head stripe and face stripe, with a soft gray color to the breast. White-throated sparrows, as their name implies, have a white patch below their bill in the throat area. In addition, there is a yellow patch of feathers between the bill and the eye. White-throats have a dark bill, as opposed to a pink color in white-crowns, but the remainder of heir plumage is remarkably similar.

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


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
