



### New movies

## Tasters praise wine from Oregon

A most prestigious wine event was recently held in New York City, one that may turn out to be historically significant as well. It was organized by Terry Robards and had many of the elements of the not amous School of the world scene, that day they equalled or excelled some of the best of the Bordeaux and White Burgundy wines in head-to-head competition.

The New York tasting, reported so far most inadequately in the press, involved wines made exclusively from the Pinot Noir: 10 from Oregon and seven red Burgundies. From what I have been able to learn so far, I can get the names of only three of the Burgundies and the same of the Oregon wines. For some time claims have been abundant about the excellent quality of Oregon wines, especially with this most difficult grap. It now seems as though they are turning out to be true. One tasting does not establish or solidify an Industry, of course, but recall the Faris tasting of a decade age to know it can help a lot If done properly, as this may have been.

THE PANELISTS were asked first to distinguish between the wines of the two regions and then to vote for their preferences. A distinguished and experienced lot, they were "amazed" at their roblective inabilities to do the formal to the formal to the control of t

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mer. In voting, the Oregon wines captured first, second and third places. Most impressiveluses were the 1833 Knudsen Erath Yamill Valley Vineyards, the 1843 Sokol Blosser Red Hills and the 1983 Adelsheim, each among the more distinguished of Oregon's Pl-not Noir makers. The three known Burgundles were the 1983 Clos de Lambrays, a 1983 Domaine Comte George de Vegue Chambolle-Musigny and the 1983 Joseph Droubin Beaune Clos de Mouches.

Significant? Only time will tell. But it will be difficult for us in Michigan to participate in this development. We have as yet but one distributor willing to carry Oregon wines, and that recently a complete the control of the finest Pion Noirs and Chardonnays to be had on the west coast. In the region around Portland, remarkably like Burgundy viticulturally, there is a great deal of promise and fulfillment for wines of great elegance and breedling. They make no Jug wines there; the grapes are too dear for bulk production. Let us hope we are given better opportunity locally to Judge them for ourselves.

ANOTHER TASTING of Interest was held locally, this one featuring 'inexpensive' cabernet savvignom; the advertised cut-off being a cert of \$8 a bottle. Sponsored by the Qakland County chapter of Lea Amis du Vin, nearly 100 people particpated in the events of the evening. Nearly half voted their preferences from among the 37 wines entered. Most of them had California appelations. There were also entries from Italy, Yugoslavia, Roumania, France and Australia.

Co-sponsors of the event, Beverage Warehouse, announced the results of the first live positions in a non-numeric manner recently. (It should be noted. and I do not want to appear too picky, that the under 18" was a B.W. price, and I do not want to appear to a celling of \$10, though many are priced well below that. Executibly this was a tasting of "everyday cabernets," not a bad idea at all.)

Chosen favorites of the evening were the 1981 Charles Le Franc (Almaden

prendum label), the 1981 Beringer Kolght's Valley (normally about \$10 t bottle), the 1981 Monterey Classic Rec (most frequently found in 1.5-liter bot tles), the Round Hill 'House' (non-vintaged) and the 1982 Fetzer Barrel Se lect (usually about \$9-10 a bottle). A YEAR OR MORE ago it was an nounced in this column that Oaklant County had its own winery, the Sevet Lakes Vineyard, in Holly. It is a testi mony to its success that it has show well in the last two Michigan Statt Fair competitions and the wines art now being marketed locally in some of our better wine shops.

Now Wayne County, not to be out done, has its own as well. It is on a bact street in Northville (i needed a loca Sherpa to get me to it), in a corner of Parmenter's Cleer Mill. What oscent there, I galther, is that cach year the test of the county of the protted grapes from California, making from these some vinifera wine as well as some local fruit wine.



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
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
