HUS BEGAN the investiture of the Honorable James L. Ryan as a United States Court of Appeals Judge in the 6th Circuit — witnessed Thursday by a standing-room-only gathering of members of the federal and state judiciarles and bar associations, United States Navy and religious orders, educators, tamily and friends.

Dozens of well-wishers who could not be accommodated in the packed court-room in downtown Detroit's United States Courthouse viewed the sobering, solemn and at times light-hearted ceremony on videotape from an adjoining room.



A life dedicated to public service, he said, "Is worth the sacrifice, and the privileges are extraordinary."


