Each region will be directed by an individual chairman, reporting directly to chairman and CEO Robert J. Mybod, he said from his Oakland County offices this week. The organizational changes are subject to approval by federal authorities.

THE REORGANIZATION, the first by a Michigah bank since legislative changes in state banking laws last month, sets up not only a mechanism for statewide banking but creates a climate for inter-state banking some day,

said industry sources.

Don Booth, executive vice president of the 360-member Michigan Bankers Association, said the changes MNB is enacting are generally viewed as

strengthening a system so as to broad-en its lending base and place liself "in an expansionary mode nationally." Second, Booth said, it should help protect against corporate take-overs. Michigan National was the subject of one such attempt in 1984 by Comerica, a Detroit-based bank holding company.

Magoullas said no layoffs are pro-posed to accommodale the changes, but; industry insiders said early retire-ments are expected. Last year MNBs closed 20 branches in southeastern. Michigan in anticipation of changes in-state banking laws, and those employ-ces have all been "absorbed," she said.
