Baylor University star guard Carlos Briggs claims he was a scapegoat and said he was dismissed from the basket-ball squad last week without proper justification by first-year coach Gene Iba.

Briggs, who led the nation in scoring two years ago at Schoolcraft College in Livonia (Mich.), was kicked off the team prior to last Tuesday's practice (Jan. 7) along with fellow senior cocaptain B.J. Mitchell.

But sources in and around the Baylor basketball program say that Briggs and Mitchell were excused from the practices. On Dec. 26, the Detroit Benedictine High School product, along with six other Baylor players, were suspended for various periods of time by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (ROAA), stemming, from alleged recruiting violations last year.
