Edward Larrabee Barnes, architect, will discuss his work at 8 p.m. today in the Detroit Institute of Arts auditori-

The event, sponsored by the DIA's Friends of Modern Art and Lawrence Institute of Technology, is open to the public.

Among Barnes' best known commissions are the Dallas Museum of Art, 1984, the Walker Art Center of Minneapolis, the Crown Center complex in Kansas City, Mo. and the IBM World Headquarters, Mt. Pleasant, N.Y.

Barnes-studied at Harvard graduate school under Gropius and Breuer and later worked for them. He currently heads Edward Larrabee Barnes Associates architectual firm in New York City.

Barnes' work has been featured in

museums including the Museum of Modern Art and the Whitney in New York and he has received numerous architectual and cultural awards.

Barnes attributes his philosophy of harmonious design to his work on the U.S. consulate building in Tabris, Iran, "When I saw the mud brick villages of the Middle East... It was their sense of continuity which impressed me the most, he said.

"It was rot only their use of one material for roofs and walls and pavements, but also the continuity of the life of the people. It seemed to me that this kind of unity should be encouraged in our lives and expressed in our architecture."
