

# Ski racers to compete Saturday

The Springfield Oaks Challenge cross country ski race will be run Saturday, Jan. 18, in that county park on Andersonville Road near Hall Road, Davisburg.

Last year it was 21 below zero, and we still had more than 100 participants," said Dan Stencil, recreation supervisor for county parks. "Springfield Oaks is a championship ski course with a great number of hills."

Races for experienced skiers start at 10 a.m.; for novices at 1 p.m. Distances range 4-15 kilometers. Fee is \$5 per participant or \$10 to participate in all five races. Sponsor is Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Michigan.

ICE FISHING reports are mostly good to fair — few tales of limit catches or flaky giants.

Good catches of crappie are coming from the lakes in the Holly Recreation Area on waxworms and wigglers. Squaw and Clear lakes near Oxford are yielding perch. Maceday and Lotus lakes are producing bluegills.

The Anchor Bay area of Lake St. Clair is producing fair to good numbers of northern pike in eight to 10 feet of water. Pike range from 4 to 10 pounds. Perch fishing is slow to poor.

Lake Erie perch fishing has diminished on Brest Bay, Estral Beach and Pte. Mouillee. Ice conditions vary with winds, so be extremely cautious.

WILD TURKEY hunt applications are available at most license dealers and the DNR district office on Williams Lake Road west of Pontiac. Deadline to apply is Feb. 1.

HURON-CLINTON Metroparks have several nature programs in the week ahead. In each case, pre-register by calling toll free 1-800-552-6772. A vehicle entry permits is required at the park gate.
