Alliance asks to have Detroit declared a military outport

An alliance of business, political and labor leaders has launched a campaign to win Detroit the designation of a military outport. If they're successful, it could bring military service and manufacturing dollars to southeastern Michigan.

But a military spokesman said Friday that the U.S. Air Force, for one, has no plans to add military outports at this time.

Wayne County Commission Chairman
John Hertel, D-Harper Woods, announced
last week that a task force has been formed
to win approval for the plan.
It would call for recouling military personnel and cargo through the Port of Detroit and Detroit's major airports. Business
gains, he sald, would be in transportation,
manufacturing and the hotel-restaurant
trade.

CAPT. TOM LAROCK, chief media spokesperson at Military Airlit Command Headquarters in Illinois' Scott Air Force Base, said the Air Force had forwarded its response in a letter to officials here.

"We told them that there were no plans (for expanding) at the moment, but we would certainly consider Detroit as a place to look at in the future,' said Laftock. There were no promises given.'

Laflock said the Air Force currently operates "gateways" or embrakation points at five national locations. These are Charleston International Airport, Philedelphia International Airport, St. Louis' Lambert

He said the Air Force's last designated site was in Charleston, Qualifications considered there included concentrated numbers of military personnel found, the facility's accessibility and traffic conditions.

HERTEL TOLD reporters the task force will travel to Washington, D.C. later this month and make a pitch before military and congressional leaders.

Members include himself; U.S. Sen. Donald Riegle, D-Mich; James Pitz, director of the Michigan Department of Transportation; Tom Turner, head of the state AFL-670, and preminent Detroit businessman Frank Stella, also known for his involvement in Republican party matters.

Hertel said he has been in close touch with U.S. Rep. Dennis Hertel, D-Detroit, his brother. The congressman's membership on two committees (Armed Services and Merchand Marine and Fisheries) could be beneficial in winning support.

Rep. Hertel also has been actively involved in other Great Lakes issues, recently helping to reinstate a U.S. Coast Guard Station in Detroit. His 14th District Includes part of Troy.

There currently is no military outport in the Great Lakes, John Hertel said. He added that cities which recently have expressed interest are Cleveland, Toledo and Milwaukee.

Our goal is to convince the federal government that Detroit and Wayne County has excellent marine and air facilities as

well as the necessary support services to warrant the designation as a military out-port," Hertel said.

JIM KELLOW, director of the Detroit-Wayne County Port Authority, and the ben-citis of the military designation in Detroit's airports would involve "more people flyi-ing" and, therefore, the potential for more flights scheduled, benefiting non-military flyers.

In addition, additional hotel and restau-rant accomodations would result, he said. Not only would military personnel fly out of Detroit's airports, but increased business would include their household belongings and private vehicles for shipment, Kellow said.

AS FOR WATERWAYS, Kellow said manufactures in southeastern Michigan could bid more compelitively for military contracts if they had the ability to ship military goods closer to home.


For example, he said, Federal Lakes Service recently was able to flag one vessel for military roll-in cargo.


The more people coming through the area of the country, the more money there's going to be spent. And the more cargo through the ports, I know there'll be more jobs, and the same goes for the airport, he said.
