One of those who had a hunch, though, was Dave Catherman.
Although he served as the Farmington junior varsity coach, Catherman rarely, if ever, watched the games from the sidelines. But there he was, on a picturesque autumn afternoon, stalking the sidelines, shouting words of instruction and encouragement to the players.

"Just wanted to see what was happening," said Catherman, who has coached track and football at Farmington High since 1962. "Don was already talking about having some troubles. He was getting discouraged. I just wanted to get a taste; to step back and see if still had a love for the game."

Last Tuesday, Catherman was named head foot-ball coach at Farmington.

"WHEN THE change became evident, a lot of the kids asked me if I was interested (in caaching)." Catherman said. "They gave me a lot of encouragement. I decided that the atmosphere around the school wasn't as bad as people were asying. The foundation is good. Don did a great job here." Catherman is no stranger to the Felicon football program. He ceached the JV program in 1983, then became a varsity assistant under ceaches Hal Beardsley and Richard Roy for the next 11 years. Catherman was interviewed for head ceaching post in 1983, the year Kuick was hired. He spent the

He led the Falcon 3V to a 5-4 season. But Cathernan has made his name as a track coach. He has been involved with the perennially powerful Falcon track program for 24 years, the head boys coach the last eight. His teams have won Western Lakes Lakes Division crowns the last three vears.

"I inherited a traditionally great program (from Jerry Young), one that I'm very proud of. We've never had a losing record. In fact, I've never had a losing record in anything, and I don't plane on chang-

ing that."

Catherman said he would continue to coach track.

CATHERMAN HELD an organizational team meeting for the football team Wednesday, and some 100 prospective players showed up.
"I laid out some things for them," he said. "I wanted them to know that they will have personal contact from me and that I wanted input from them. I told them I wanted to get the parents involved; that I wanted to get a commitment from the school. I want to improve the out-of-school op-portunities for these kids. I want to work on getting a weight room. I wanted to let them know that we will be more organized in our preparation for the season."

One of the areas Catherman is most anxious to improve is the program's image — one he perceives as somewhat negative.

"In a Farmington product (class of 1958), and I've never really lost my loyalty to the school," he said. I hope to continue to improve our image. We have to eliminate the negative press and build up the character of the kids. We have to get them to take pride in both their school and the program."

CATHERMAN IS currently putting his staff to-gether. He has already named Forrest Geary as his varsity assistant. Geary hold that role under Kulck.
