

# Jewish telethon scheduled

Caring is what it's all about. That's the message for the 1986 Allied Jewish Campaign's Super Sunday telethon on Feb. 2.

The telephone appeal is being held simultaneously in 150 communities across the country. Money that is raised helps support the life-sustaining work of the Jewish Welfare Federation and its annual campaign through 70 worldwide beneficiaries.

This year's effort will feature "Super Sunday Super Stars," a salute in song to the services provided through the campaign and to the hundreds of volunteers responsible for manning a bank of 80

The festive atmosphere won't take away from the serious business of the day — asking contributors to respond with their best possible pledge in support of human services for the elderly, handicapped and youngsters here at home, in Israel and elsewhere overseas. Shelby Tauber of Franklin and N. Brewster Road of Southfield are chairing this year's event, which will reach 10,000 households in the metropolitan area.

A shotgun and a rifle valued at \$150 were reported stolen from a house on Kendallwood Jan. 23.

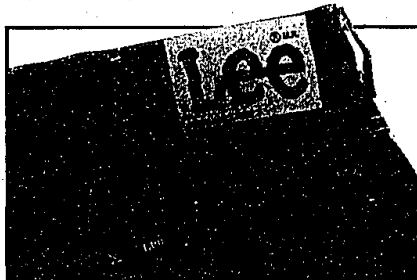
Cash was reported stolen from Putt 'n Games on Grand River Jan. 23.
