Shasky, a Birmingham Brother Rice grad and Bloomfield Hills native, is a co-capitaln for the Gophers. A week ago they were peaking, A win over University of Michigan, at the time unbeaten, got them started. They followed with victories ever Michigan State and, last Thursday, at Wisconsin.

The next day, Gopher coach Jim Dutcher resigned, Sunday's game at Northwestern was forfeited. The balance of the season was in question.

Shasky who, like many college players hoping for a good enough season to induce a pro contract, was watching his career crumble. Injury. Certainly not because of his own failings. Not even due to the sometimes cruel, fickle fate produced by the bounce of a basketball.


