Which is what Oakland University men's basketball coach Greg Kampe did for Saturday's game at Saginaw Valley State. Kampe benched senior starters Walt Dixon and Chris Howze. For Howze, an all-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) performer last season, it was only the second time he did not start in his OU career. But in the three previous games, Howze had made just eight of 38 floor shots.
