Under present law, a person who buys a new car or a dealer-demonstrator model from a dealership has almost no protection if that car was severely damaged prior to sale.

Other then to avoid bad customer relations, the dealer has virtually no incentive to inform a prospective purchaser that a car has been damaged.

The Faxon bill would require a new car dealer to fully inform a customer about all damage the dealer knows or should know about, if the damage

amounts to \$500 or more.

"I heard about a case where a deal-er-demonstrator was hit by two police cars involved in a high-speed chase," Faxon said. "The city's insurance company paid for the repairs and the car was sold as new. "It wasn't until the unfortunate owners confronted the dealership about the severe problems with fit, finish, rattles, missing parts, bad brakes and bent wheel rins, that they admitted the source of the damage. "The owners had no relevant recourse except to swallow their pride and take the car back to the dealership whenever a new problem was discov-

ered."

Under the bill, if a car is being sold pas new or as a demonstrator model, the dealer would have to provide the customer with written notice of all repairs made to the vehicle. The notice would




