## Retrial eyed in '67 murder case

It was 1967. Sharon Ann Merlo was seeking a divorce from her husband, John, and had moved with a 3-month-old son back into her parents' Redford Township house

John, and had moved with a 3-montholds on back into her parents' Redford Township home.

On what Farmington Hills Police Capt. Russell Conway remembers as a snowy Jan. 6 morning, Sharon Merio was shampooling a customer's hair when John Merio walked into the beauty shop on Eight Mile Road, in what was then Farmington Township, and asked to speak with his estranged wife. The couple went into the back room of the beauty shop, where, as customers in the shop later recalled, the Merios argued. Sharon then returned to her customer. Her husband followed her, pulled out a .32-calliber revolver and shot his 16-year-old wife four times. Sharon Merio was pronounced dead on arrival at Boisford General Hospital.

After the shooting, Sharon Merlo's parents took custody of her 3-month-old son, Jetf. Although Sharon's mother

Last year's Christmas card pictured the Rebtoy family of Farmington Hills in front of a burning house — and all five members were smilling.

The photo, taken at a Farmington Hills fire drill, deplets the involvement of an entire family in a fire-flighter's life, Bob Rebtoy said.

A fire scanner in the family's living room and in the bedroom leave nothing to chance. Emergencies always come first.

The 1985 Farmington Hills Fire-flighter of the Year recalls many family outings missed in the past 18 years because of fires and emergencies. Many card games or visits with friends are spent near a scanner in case of emergency.

"Most of our friends are fire-flighters, or work in fire-related fields," he said.

DESPITE THE missed opportuni-ties, Rebtoy expects to be fighting fires and aiding with medical emer-gencies until he reaches age 55 — at

gencies until he reaches age 55 — at least.

"Sometimes. I wonder how long I'll go," he added.
