

North, Hawks spilled in pool

Smolinski quietly signs with MSU

Quietly, without much fanfare, Brian Smolinski gained 1,064 yards rushing and catching the football for Farmington Harrison last fall. The previous spring, Smolinski quietly led Harrison's baseball team to the Class A semifinals hitting better than .400.

Last Wednesday, Smolinski quietly, and without much fanfare, signed a letter of intent to play football at Michigan State University. He also expects to play baseball at the university.

"I think it's better for me," said Smolinski of his lack of notoriety. "Like with John Miller, he had all the publicity and people were expecting so much from him. I don't know if people were disappointed in him or not, but he was under a lot of pressure."

"I don't think I'll have as much pressure on me. My name wasn't on any of the blue chip lists."

SMOLINSKI HAS things in pretty good perspective about his future at MSU.

"I'm not expecting to play too much my freshman year," Smolinski said. "I think I might have a good shot at making the travel team, though."

Smolinski said he was told that the team would carry six or seven receivers on road trips next fall. The Spartans have five wide receivers returning from last year, including starters Andre Rison and Mark Ingram.

"I'm real pleased with Brian's decision," said John Herrington, who coached Smolinski both on the grid-

iron and on the baseball diamond. "I don't know if it'll be what you call an impact player or not. But he'll be a good player for them. He'll play two sports for them as long as his grades hold up. He'll kind of be like another Todd Krumm."

Todd Krumm, from West Bloomfield, starts for both the football and baseball teams at MSU.

AFTER TWO superb seasons at Harrison (97 catches for 1,668 yards and 12 touchdowns), Smolinski was virtually snubbed by those who select all-state teams and blue chip lists.

Said Smolinski: "The receiver coaches at State saw films of me and said I was good in all phases except speed. They were concerned whether I had enough speed to get open."

"I think he has big 10 talent," Herrington said. "He wasn't recruited all that heavy because he doesn't have that 4.4 (in the 40-yard dash) but he's closer to 4.6. But he can get open, and he can catch the ball."

Smolinski visited Penn State and considered offers from Notre Dame and Boston College before deciding on MSU.

"IT WAS close to home so my parents could come see me play," he said of MSU. "And I know a lot of people going up there. I talked it over (with his parents) and he told me nice things about the program. Plus, it's a Big 10 school so you know the academics are sound."

Smolinski plans to study business. When asked if being snubbed by the blue chip lists would help motivate him next year, Smolinski said, "Andre Rison and Mark Ingram — that's all the motivation I need."
