I see a woman who often experienced vacillating feelings between her heart and her head. The slant of one's handwriting is probably the most easily changed aspect. Skill it is significant to note that the slant in the body of your letter is vertical to slightly backward while on the envelope it is slanted far to the right. Changing letter sizes also confirm the ambivalence you experience almost daily.

You are rather direct in the manner in which you face your life. Through the years you have learned not to be

overly concerned with how others see you.

I ALSO SEE a busy woman who must wear many different hats. In the world of business you have learned to be a bit manipulative to get the job done. And are often more amiable and friendly than you may inwardly feel. (That is indicated by the long lower loops that entangle in the line below, some large first letters, and the wide spacing between letters.)

Some past hurts cause you to have your guard up with certain people to prevent this from recurring.

Your mind is curious, active and analytical. You question, analyze and then ferret out answers until you feel satisfied with them. You are not glib. Once you have made up your mind, you can be rather firmly based and do not allow others to sway your thinking. But with those you love, you're probably a real "sussy cat," right?

Registrations are taken by calling the school's adult education department, 473-8900.

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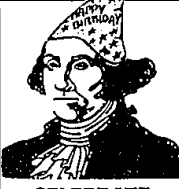
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
