THE FARMINGTON branch was hit "very hard" with employee changeovers, Papal added. In 1931-82, the downtown branch had 4.5 professionals, and now has only three. She clso noted that during the past fiscal year "the former director replaced some positions at different levels — including replacing some professionals with para-professionals or part-time employees," which has harmed the library's usefulness.

Once the computer conversion in the adult section of the library is completed. Deadman said, city officials may again review the staffing situation. He said the conversion "has placed extraordinary demands on all library personnel. The staffing problem has

been further complicated by the turn-over in administration and professional staff during the past year."
Papal said she would return to the cities with a request for hiring a third person included in her proposed fiscal budget for 1986-87. Even so, the library budget will probably increase only by 4.75 percent, according to Papal's pre-liminary figures.
The cost of the two positions for the remaining months of the current fiscal year will be \$16,000, with Farmington Hills paying \$14,000 and Farmington \$1,920.
Farmington Hills Councilman Ben Marks moved to hire the three employ-ees requested by Papal lost week, but received no support for his motion.

## GM recalls cars, trucks

General Motors is re-calling some 1985 cars and trucks. GM is asking owners of about 28,000 model-year 1985 Chevrolet Caprices and Pontiac Parlsiennes

With 4.3-liter V6 engines and about 850 model-year 1985 Chevrolet and GMC light-duty trucks with dual rear wheels to re-turn their vehicles to dealers for inspections

and/or modifications.

The Caprice and Parisienne models will be checked for two conditions— a mispositioned battery cable and a mispositioned fuel line.

Either condition could result in an underhood fire.

GM officials say they are not aware of any accidents or injuries as a result of the conditions, which were revealed through field reports.
