One of two Class C liquor-by-the-glass licenses that Farmington Hills of-ficials have held in reserve for two ma-jor office developments has been ex-

tended for another two years.

At the request of the developers —
Peter Burton, Ron Hughes and Robert
Katzman of the Arboretum Office Park
— the Farmington Hills City Council
agreed to hold the liquor license in reserve until March 1988.

The license was first held in reserve
for the developers in March 1984 in anticipation that a restaurant would be in
operation in the office park within two
years — by March 1986, sald City Clerk

JoAn Reynolds. Council at that time agreed that if the license was not in use by a restaurant in the office park by March 13, 1986, the license would be

reconsidered.
"We have been, as you can tell, forgIng ahead on our Arboretum," said developer Burton. "We have been unable
to get a signature on the dotted line for

Phased construction on the planned six three-story buildings on 50 acres along 12 Mite, between Drake and Farmington roads, began in fall 1984. The first building has been completed and is occupied. A permit has been is-sued and footings installed for phase two. The proposed restaurant, howev-er, is supposed to be connected by walkways to phases one and three, Bur-ton sald.
