A fight between two groups of young people, ages 17-20, resulted in the arrest of two 19-year-old Gakland County men Friday night, Farmington Hills Folice said.

A West Ilboenfield man was charged with five counts of felonious assault and one count of maliclous destruction of property over \$100. A Bloomfield Township man was charged with two counts of felonious assault and one count of maliclous destruction of property Conviction could bring a penalty of up to four years in prison and a \$2,000 (line on each count.

Arraigned Saturday before District Judge Margaret Schaeffer of Farmington, the men stood mute. They were released on personal pond pending a preliminary examination in 47th District Court.
