Face framing for spring

Face-framing styles with lots of volume and fullness, but decidedly longer, is what the Glammy experts at Hudson's are saying for hair in the spring of '88. The first essential is bangs, full and layered, ending at the brow or shorter. The second essential is the airy wisps that frame the face, sometimes sparked with tipped highlights. But it's the sweeping forward movement of the hair from the back and finishing into gentle feathering on the face that gives the contemporary look. Comb-out is easy with brush, blow drying and your hands. For permed or curlier hair, add mousse, scrunch hair with hands and let dry naturally into a tumble of cascading waves.

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
