House OKs bill to aid victims of terrorists

Here's how area members of Con-gress were recorded on major roll-call votes during the week ending March 21.

HOUSE

AID TO TERRORIST VICTIMS — By a 252-144 vote, the House defeat-ed an attempt to have Congress each year decide the funding of a progam that would aid victims of terorism

The vote occurred during debate on IR 1151, which is a wide-ranging anti-terrorism bill. IR 1151, which was later approved and sent to the Senate, would authorize \$4.4 billion for such purposes as strengthening security at American embassies and compensating the 52 Americans held hostage in Iran six years ago.

The bill creates a structure of direct payments and medical and educational benefits for government employees and family members who saufer at the hands of foreign terrorists.

The bill calls for payments to be automatic and not reviewable by Congress. Rep. Robert Walker, R. Pa., sponsored the amendment which would have funding and payments go through Congressional channels each year.

Opponent Patricia Schoreder, D. Colo., said: "This is not a huge entitlement. We do not know that it will ever cost anything... But let us beable to say as the U.S. Congress to people working for this government; if something happens to you, we are going to take care of your family

Voting yes in favor of Walker's amendment was flep. Carl Pursell, R.Plymouth.
Voting no against the amendment and in favor of automatic payments were: Reps. Denais Hertel, D-Harper Woods, William Ford, D-Taylor, Sander Levin, D-Southfield, and William Broomfield, Birmingham.

AID TO CONTRAS — The House rejected, 210 for and 222 against, President Reagan's request for \$100 million in foreign aid for the "con-tra" army which is battling the San-dinista government of Nicaragua.

Another House vote and a Senate vote are to be conducted in upcoming weeks.

Supporter Bill McCollum, R-Fla., said that if left unchecked the Sandistas government "will spread its revolution and terrorism to its neighbors and ultimately to the United States."

Opponent Howard Wolpe, D-Mich, sald the Reagan Administration "is engaged in the buildup of a permanent military presence in Central America right now, and additional dig the contras is only another step in the escalation of America's military involvement in the region and the steady march toward war."

Voling yes to support Reagan's re-quest for \$100 million in contra aid were Republicans Pursell and Broomfield.

Voting against the proprosal were Democrats Hertel, Ford and Levin.

SENATE

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FEDERAL JUDGE — By a vote of 52 for and 42 against, the Senate confirmed the nomination of Sidney A. Fitzwater, 22, as a federal district judge for the Northern District of Texas.

Although most federal court nominations breeze through the Senate confirmation process, this one was disputed because of something Fitzwater did as a state judge in Texas.

On the eve of 1982 voting, Fitzwater reportedly put up large signs in noe neighborhoods that warned against violating the Texas election code. Critics salt the signs misstated, Texas law and were designed to intimidate minority voters.

Joseph Bilden, D-Del, said Fitzwater has falled "10 exercise the necessary judgment or temperament to excell the interest.

sary judgment or temperament to qualify him to serve in the special and trusted position of a federal court judge."

Supporter Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., said: "if you are against the man, of course, you can always find some reason to be against him."

U.S. Senators Carl Levin and Donald Riegle, both Democrats, voted against confirming his appointment.

I-696 improvements sought

Plans to widen I-696 and add two interchanges in Farmington Hills were boosted last week by the Southeast Michiga Country of the Southeast Andrews of the Southeast Andrews

THE 1-695 plans endorsed by SEMCOG include:

• Adding an interchange west of Drake Road in Farmington Hills.

• Adding an interchange in the vicinity of Haggerty Road, at the place where 1-696, 1-96 and 1-275 come together in Novi.

Costs of the two projects, both for construction and right-of-way, are estimated at \$20 million.

Currently 1-696 in western Oakland has two lanes in each direction and

dorses traffic studies on the Haggerty Road corridor and that an environmen-tal impact statement would come lat-

SEMOOG's Council on Regional Development suggested the study area run from Eight Mile Road to M-59 in the middle of the county.

Detroit Council President Erma Henderson asked by letter for a more detailed study before any commitment is made to the project, Hustoles said. Michael Turner, a staff assistant to Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, failed to win an amendment asking for studies of such "indirect" costs as population stimulation, utilities, police and fire protection.

A SIERRA Club representative, in the public comments section of the meeting, warned against any steps toward reviving the 85.275 project. The Michigan Department of Transportation has dropped M-275, which was to be a freeway in the Haggerty corridor from Novi to Davisburg. The Oakland County Boad Commission still favors an M-275 freeway. Current thinking in M-DOT and the Oakland County Board of Commissioners is that the Haggerty corridor be a multilane, divided state highway.

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
