Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police and fire calls received during the past week.

WOMAN BURNED

A homeowner suffered hand burns when a pan of grease caught fire in the kitchen of a house on Olde Franklin July 1.

Flame damage was confined to the kitchen but smoke damage was reported throughout the two-story house. Lt. Peter Baldwin of the

Farmington Hills Fire Department said.

2 ARRESTED

Two Detroit teen-agers who allegedly stole two cars from the Quality Inn were arrested early Thursday by Farmington Hills and Southfield police officers.

Charges are pending.

Sgt. Al Haver, who heads Farmington Hills' Special Patrol Opera-

tional Team, said when he noticed a 1988 Oldsmobile with a broken driver's window eastbound on 12 Mile about 1 a.m. he decided to follow it.

A Chrysler was behind the Olds. At 1-698, both cars entered the freeway. Near Lahser, Southfield and Farmington Hills officers tried to box in the Olds, but it exited at Lahser. At Lahser and Northwest, officers again tried to box in the Olds, but it swerved, first striking Haver's car, then the car of Hills Officer Al Soderlund. Soderlund's

car was pushed into that of a Southfield officer, Haver said.

The Olds then re-entered I-698, exited at Eight Mile and, after driving along the median, headed south on a Detroit street, where the driver lost control and hit a tree. The three occupants ran, but the 16-year-old driver was caught, Haver said.

The driver of the LeBaron, a 17-year-old, was stopped and arrested at 10 Mile and I-698. A rear window of the LeBaron was found broken. The steering columns of both cars were found damaged, the sergeant said.

SUSPECT NABBED

Farmington Hills and Farmington officers assisted in the apprehension of a suspect man, who allegedly robbed a Royal Oak gas station at gunpoint Wednesday evening.

After hearing a radio description of the suspect's car about 7:50 p.m., Southfield and Farmington Hills officers joined Oak Park officers in pursuit westbound on Nine Mile.

A Farmington officer joined the pursuit at Grand River and Power. At Farmington Road, the suspect turned south and continued to run red lights, according to a Farmington Hills police report. At Eight Mile, a Wayne County Sheriff's deputy joined the pursuit.

At Five Mile and Farmington Road in Livonia, the suspect swerved to avoid a roadblock, ran a red light and struck an eastbound car. The collision turned the suspect's car around. The car then hit a pole and caught fire. The man was arrested and turned over to Oak Park Police, according to the Farmington Hills police report.

2 ARRESTED

Two Detroit men were arrested and a gun confiscated early July 1 after the men allegedly eluded Farmington Department of Public Safety officers.

Their vehicle was followed along Shawasee, northbound Farmington Road, and eastbound 10 Mile, where

it reached speeds of 60-65 mph. The vehicle came to a stop north of 10 Mile, near Power. A loaded, 26-caliber, semiautomatic pistol was confiscated, according to the public safety report.

Ratification of a collective bargaining agreement with AFSCME Local 1456, which represents the city's Department of Public Services workers, is slated for discussion by the council.

An increase for solid waste disposal will be discussed, an ordinance amending water and sewer rates is scheduled for adoption and bids on cleaning of public safety officers' uniforms will be considered.

Sinai plans new facility

Everyone's been to a groundbreaking ceremony, but a ground-replaces the traditional scapel in zapping? That's exactly what Sinai Health Services will host at 11 a.m. Wednesday at the site of the new Sinai Surgery Center in Farmington Hills.

The Surgery Center is slated to open in the summer of 1987. Ground will be "zapped" with a Sharpian 1100 CO2 laser provided by the U.S. Medical Corporation. Its ability to transform solid cells into water vapor makes the CO2 laser one of the most versatile lasers being used today.

This piece of modern technology

replaces the traditional scapel in many of the surgical procedures to be performed at the state-of-the-art ambulatory center.

The Surgery Clinic will be on the east side of Orchard Lake, north of 12 Mile.

It is an affiliate of Sinai Health Services, a health care system which includes, Sinai Hospital of Detroit, the Louis C. and Edith B. Blumberg Professional Office Building in Detroit, the Nathan I and Betty Goldin Health Care Center in West Bloomfield and the Samuel and Lillian Hechtman Center in Bingham Farms.
