## Get close to improve your photographs

Moving in close is one of the most important guidelines in improving your photography. Most all 35mm cameras can only bring you in the work of the wor

Shooting close-ups is fun and easy and can be achieved with a minimal

close-up accessories from which to choose.

• Close-up filters: These are the least expensive means of taking close-ups and usually come in set of three. They are executly the magnifying classes when serwed onto the front of your lens.

A No. 1 filter will allow you to closus to within 16 inches, a No. 2 to about 10 inches and a No. 3 to approximately six Inches. Combining two or all three will enable you to focus extremely close to your subject.

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Close-up rings: Also called extension tubes, these rings are sold in sets of three. The idea is to attach one or a combination of the hollow tubes between the lens and the camera body. The further the lens is



• Extension bellows: Here, a flexible bellows is placed between the lens and camera body similar to extension tubes. The advantages of bellows are that you have infinite latitude of lens to subject distances and you can people or a reason.

• Macro lenses: 'A macro lens is a closc-up lens in itself, Macro lenses can be carried on your camera as a normal lens and then can quickly be converted to a closc-up lens without stopping to add accessories. Many of today's popular zoom lenses have a

macro mode which is fine but may not move you in as close as a pure macro leas.

Remember that any exposure increase with close-up equipment is adjusted for automatically on cameras with through-the-leas meteriae.


