Farmington Hills City Council Council Chambers 31555 11 Mile, Farmington Hills 7:30 tonight

Council will review a report from the Oakland County Road Commission on the proposed widening of 12 Mile bridge at Pebble Creek, between Incker and Middlebelt, consider a license application for an

adult foster care facility at 21521 Waldron.

Also to be considered is an amendment to the house party ordinance, appointments to boards and commissions and approval process for the city's master storm drainage plan.

Council will review results of petitioning efforts for paving, and the use of federal Community Development Block Grant money. A request has

been made to change the public hearing date for the CDBG program to April 28.

The 1985 Farmington Hills Police Department's annual report will be presented. Council will consider a waiver from an existing requirement to pave a road extension for Holly Hill Drive in Pasadena Park subdivision; adoption of a resolution to retain a contractor to supply and install energy efficient storm windows for city hall.
