"If private clubs want to discriminate, line, but don't deduct your business expenses when you discriminate. Another thing, at the DAC we've assigned police officers there and asked them not to ticket. Now we're using tax dollars for that, and we're missing tax dollars for an institution that discriminates. That's the argument.
