Core curriculum at the three high schools consists of geophysical science, basic geophysical science, basic geophysical science and biology I at the ninth grade level, with the following course offered to upper-level students: basic biology, biology I, biology II, chemistry, descriptive chemistry, advanced placement chemistry, advanced placement chemistry physics, accelerated physics (North Farmington only) and electronics.

ACTUAL CLASS offerings are based on pre-enrollment by students, which determines what courses are offered at the three schools, Nutter sald. Because of this, many of the

According to statistics from the 1985 graduating classes, between 77 and 84 percent of Farmington students took two or more science classes during their high school

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career, according to Nutter's report.
"The science department staff has, for some time, recommended a two-year science requirement," the report said.
Part of the reasoning was based on review of the Michigan Commission on High Schools

Preliminary Report, the State Board of Education Plan and A Nation at Risk — all which suggested two or three years of science. A survey of the state's clittens also showed the public favoring a three-year science coordinator Doug Cooper added.

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#### Councils support. cleanup

The city councils of both Farming-ton and Farmington Hills have adopted resolutions in support of Rouge Rescue '86 — a "clean up the Rouge River day" scheduled for Sat-urday, June 7.

The day is designed to publicize the environmental problems in the Rouge River Watershed Basin and to gain support for tackling them.

Rouge Rescue '86 calls for all basin communities to schedule river cleanup activities in the morning and a recreational activity in the aft-eroon. Both Farmington and Farm-ington Hills are in the process of planning appropriate events.

THE ROUGE River Basin is a 125-mile waterway, draining 467 square miles in southeast Michigan. It flows through 36 communities and three counties.

The Michigan Water Resources Commission has designated the Rouge River Basin as a Class A area of concern. That designation identi-fies the waterway as a major pollu-tant to the Great Lakes.

The Rouge River Basin Strategy, approved by the Water Resources Commission, calls upon all basin communities to work toward identifying goals and objectives relating to correction of the pollution.

THE RESOLUTION adopted by the Farmington Hills City Council April 14 reads in part. The water quality of the Rogue is extremely poor and characterized by proliferation of gross solids, turbidity, odors, low oxygen, contaminated sediments and algae, all of which pose health and safety problems and prevents the enjoyment of this resource by the public."

Although supporting Rouge Rescue '86, Farmington isn't planning to organize a cleanup effort for June.

As City Manager Robert Deadman explained, "The city of Farmington has shown its concern about the con-dition of the Rouge River for many

"The beautification committee sponsored a Rouge River cleanup approximately 15 years ago. As a result of this effort, obstructions, debris, tires and ear parts were removed from the river. Since that time, the Department of Public Services has periodically cleaned the river."

CITY OFFICIALS recently walked the portion of the Rouge that flows through the city and found the river relatively clean with the ex-ception of trees that have fallen across the river near Brookdale Con-dos.

"At the present time, these trees do not hinder the flow of water nor are they collecting debris. The re-maining portion of the river is clear of debris and fallen trees," Deadman


#### Farmington board seats newly filled
