Alcohol and drugs affect families too

emotional problems, lack of self-esteem and possible addiction in children or other family members.

"TOO FEW people know how to recognize the despair of the kids," the narrator added.

"I always thought chemically dependent people had the problem, before I began working in therapy with family members," Eisenhauer added. "They (the families) think if that person recovers... everything will be fine."

"It doesn't work that way. It's a myth that you send a person into therapy and everything's fine. Sometimes, it's just the beginning," Eisenhauer believes family mem-

bers involved with chemical dependencies take "the road of least resistance," as a survival tactic, and suggests family counseling to help the problem. If one person breaks out of the recognized roles, other family members can be helped, she added.

Just taking the alcohol or drug away from the addicted person does not cure the disease, she added. For family members, the effect of the recognized roles in the disease are carried into adult lives.

"ALL CHILDREN of chemically dependent people are high-risk users," she added.

All family members exhibit symptoms of the problem that surrounds them, Eisenhauer said. "If we can identify them, we can offer hope."
