

# Rocks tip North; Marlins tie

A few compasses might've been in order Monday as North Farmington was blown off course in the first half

in girls soccer action. As a result, visiting Plymouth Salem directed in four goals and came

away with a 4-1 victory in a Western Lakes match under blustery conditions.

The Rocks (5-2-1), with the wind at their backs, could do nothing wrong in the first 40 minutes. Julie Tortora, Pam Mayer, Michelle Cygan and Rachel Thiet all knocked in first half goals for the Chiefs.

Cygan's goal was actually scored by a North Farmington player. Cygan sent a high cross to the middle of the field which bounced off a North Farmington defender and into the net.

Sandy Spahn had the Raiders' lone goal in the second half as North Farmington couldn't capitalize with the wind at its back. The first-half damage the Rocks dealt was too much to overcome.

## NOTICE OAKLAND TECHNOLOGY PARK PUBLIC HEARING

The cities of Auburn Hills and Rochester Hills in cooperation with the Michigan Departments of Commerce and Transportation and the Oakland County Road Commission are calling a public hearing on Thursday, May 8, 1986 at 7:30 p.m. in the Rochester Hills City Hall, 1275 W. Avon Road.

The purpose of the public hearing is to provide area citizens the opportunity to view the plans and discuss the impacts of the proposed Oakland Technology Park and associated road improvements. The Oakland Technology Park proposes to be a center for high industrial technology. Located near Oakland University and Oakland Community College, the approximate 1,100-acre site of the technology park area runs along Interstate 75, just north of M-59 in the cities of Auburn Hills and Rochester Hills. This project may affect area wetlands and floodplains.

Copies of the draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for this project are available for public viewing at the Auburn Hills City Hall, 1827 N. Squirrel Road, the Rochester Hills City Hall, 1275 W. Avon Road, the Auburn Hills Public Library, 1827 N. Squirrel Road, the Rochester Hills Public Library, 210 W. University, and the Oakland County Service Center Reference Library in the Executive Office Building, 1200 N. Telegraph Road, Pontiac.

This hearing is held in accordance with Federal & State Public Involvement/Public Hearings Procedures. Information concerning the right-of-way acquisition and the relocation assistance programs will be provided at the hearing. Testimony will be taken from interested citizens regarding the social, environmental, and economic impact of the proposed project. Written statements and exhibits in place of, or in addition to, oral statements made at the public hearing may be submitted to Philip J. Chisholm, Public Hearings Officer, Hearings & Mitigation Section, Michigan Department of Transportation, P.O. Box 30060, Lansing, Michigan, 48909, at anytime up to fifteen days after the date of the public hearing.

To further assist you in understanding the project, an Informal Open House will be held in the Auburn Hills City Hall, 1827 N. Squirrel Road, Auburn Hills, on Thursday, May 1, 1986 from 3:30 to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 9:30 p.m. This Open House provides the opportunity for the public to drop in during the above hours and discuss on a one to one basis the proposal and its impacts.

## CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING APRIL 28, 1986

Mayor Alkateeb opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on April 28, 1986 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Alkateeb, Dolan, Dudley, Marka, Sever, Soronen and Wolf. Others present: City Manager Costick, City Clerk Reynolds, City Attorney Elberts and Planning Commission. An award for Distinguished Budget Presentation was presented to Mayor, on behalf of City, by the Government Finance Officers Association.

Minutes of April 7, 1986 were approved as published and minutes of April 9, 1986 and April 11, 1986 were approved as amended.

Mayor proclaimed week of April 27-May 3, 1986 as Michigan Gifted Child Week and week of May 4-11, 1986 as Days of Remembrance for the Victims of the Holocaust.

Council adopted SAD Resolution No. 3, to proceed with road improvements for Westgate Road, South Brook Lane, North Brook Lane and Richmond Hill Road in Westgate Franklin Village Subdivision.

Council adopted SAD Resolution No. 3, to proceed with road improvements for Kirby and Cass in Farmington Acres Subdivision.

Ordinance C-14-86 was enacted, amending Zoning Ordinance, Section 60.2303, Accessory Building and Structures and the summary was approved for publication.

Ordinance C-15-86, Zoning Request 2-1-86, was enacted, rezoning approximately 11.36 acres on east side of Haggerty Road, north of Nine Mile in Section 30, from RA-2 to OS-4.

Ordinance C-16-86, Zoning Request 3-1-86, was enacted, rezoning approximately .965 acres on east side of Haggerty Road, south of Nine Mile in Section 31, from RA-1 to OS-4.

Ordinance C-17-86, Zoning Request 4-1-86, was enacted, rezoning approximately 20 acres on north side of Twelve Mile, east of Haggerty in Section 7, from RA-1 to RP-1.

Consideration of Site Plan and Landscape Plan 61-2-86, Multiple Units for Farmington Ridge Subdivision PHD in Section 6 was postponed for reports by staff.

Council approved request from Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission that construction bond of Metrovision of Oakland County be released.

Council accepted transmittal of Capital Improvement Program 1986/87-1991/92 from Planning Commission.

Date of June 2, 1986 was set for public hearing for vacation of utility and drainage easements for Orchard Place Apartments in Section 2.

Date of June 2, 1986 was set for public hearing for vacation of portion of alley in Richland Estates Subdivision in Section 36.

Council approved Community Development Block Grant Program for 1986, allocating \$28,000 for Administration, \$136,000 for Housing Rehabilitation, and \$110,000 for Capital Improvement.

Council approved storm sewer enclosure at Freedom Road near Gill Road in Section 28.

Resolution was adopted increasing water rate to \$7.51 per 1,000 cubic feet of water consumed, effective July 1, 1986.

Resolution was adopted maintaining sewer rate charges of \$8.23 per 1,000 cubic feet of metered water consumption, through Fiscal Year 1988/87.

Traffic Control Order No. P-74-1986 was adopted, prohibiting parking at all times along south side of Silwassee Road from east edge of Verdun Street easement to west edge of Colwell Avenue.

Council accepted transmittal of 1986/87 Operating and Capital Budgets.

Presentations were made by City Engineer regarding Major Road Improvement Program.

Council established policy that in all future elections, notice of availability of absent voter applications will be provided in City Newsletter immediately preceding such election.

Special City Council meeting date of May 5, 1986 was established.

Meeting adjourned at 11:20 p.m.

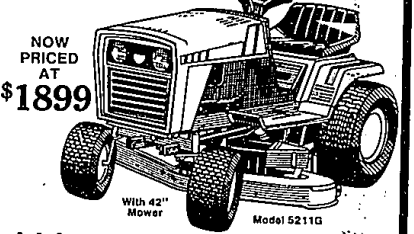
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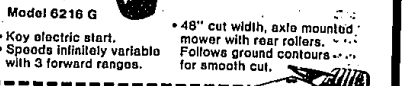
