"For aesthetics and appearance, underground wiring will be desirable," but he also mentioned that eventually the consumer will be paying for the wires by having the cost "tacked on the price of the lot."

Farmington Township has required underground wiring for new subdivisions since July 1968.

It makes the subdivision much more attractive but also underground wiring reduces such dangers as children climbing poles and trees to get a kite or being injured by a downed wire, 'said Township Trustee Margaret Schaeffer.

Mrs. Schaeffer also mentioned that she'd like to see a gradual pole-replacing program undertaken by the Detroit Edison Co.

THE CHAIRMAN of the City of Farmington Beautifi-cation Committee, Mrs. Noel Kurth, feels that the under-ground wiring will not be "bothering the eye" as poles do. "Appearance-wise it seems a feasible thing." The new ruling, which originated in the Michigan

Public Service Commission, includes a provision for replacng existing overhead residential electric lines at the "option of the affected customer or customers."

THE CITY of Farmington has found out from F.M. Hoppe, state director of public utilities, that this provision applies only if all the residents of a subdivision requested that then existing overhead lines be placed underground.

"A possible solution to this problem would be for the group to form a 'utility district,' as is done for the extension of water and sewer service, if this can be accomplished under existing gatutes." Hoppe's letter concluded.
