Conference At OU Set For Nurses

Professional nurses are invited to Oakland University on Wednesday, Sept. 30, to take part in a day planned to benefit their special needs.

The Leadership Development in Nursing Conference will begin in the Oakland Center Building, with registration at 8 a.m., and will adjourn at 3:30 p.m.

"We will welcome all echelons of professionals from the new registered nurse to veteran supervisors," said Flor-etta Cueniga, R.N., who will be one of the speakers. Mrs. Cueniga, an associate professor at Oakland Community College, will talk about the need for leadership.

"We hope to bring out clearly the directions a nurse's leadership can take today," she said. "They need to know the best ways to use the abilities of practical nurses, orderlies and aides. They can improve communication between their teams and doctors therapy units and others. Nurses

also need to be aware of how patients may use such facilities as nursing homes, and visiting nurses."

"IN THE LAST 18 months," she continued, "there has been great controversy about health care. There are clinics and other forms of public health care available to patients now. Unless nurses develop skill in coordinating the widening health care picture now, there could be trouble."

Orlan Worden will speak about leadership styles and techniques. He has served on the faculties of the University of Michigan and the University of Windsor and is a training consultant in private practice.
