Quakers Plan Area Meetings

Quakers in Plymouth, Livonia, Farmington and Northville who are interested in attending worship-study meetings will be under the care of the Detroit Friends Meeting, 9640 Saratoga Ave., Detroit 48227. Plans are now under way to hold occasional gatherings for worship, study and peace activity in the area by the Religious Society of Friends, commonly called Quakers. The meetings will begin in October. The small fellowship groups will be under the care of the Detroit group and will open their meetings with periods of silent waiting, followed by study of the book of Discipline and implementation of individual concerns for spiritual communication and healing, as well as the traditional testimonies for peace and equity.

Dr. Johnson served as the academic dean of Washington Bible College, Washington, D.C., from 1964 to 1968. He is a member of the executive council of the Central American Mission, Dallas, Texas. He has visited various mission fields abroad and has toured both the Holy Land and Europe. A native of Erie, Pa., he has had churches in Indiana and Texas. He and his wife, Martha, now reside in Birmingham. They have three sons. Dr. Johnson graduated from Bob Jones University, Greenville, S.C., and received his master of theology and doctor of theology degrees from Dallas Theological Seminary.

FRIENDS WERE PERSECUTED for their opposition to war and oppression in Britain and settled in the American Colonies. Today, the society emphasizes holy obedience to the leadings of the Holy Spirit as shown in mystical worship, in silent waiting on the inward light, and in the teaching of God. Attainment of a personal sense of inward peace forms the basis of all Quaker activity.

Quaker families were among the earliest settlers of Farmington, Livonia, Plymouth and Northville. Quaker meetings were held in the homes of Arthur Power of Farmington in 1807; Erasmus Hussey of Plymouth, in 1828; David Lapham of Livonia, in 1827; and Alanson Aldrich of Northville, in 1828. Two permanent groups were organized, at Farmington in 1831, and at Plymouth in 1834.

MUSIC FOR the services will be furnished by Natalie Conrad, pianist; Mrs. Doralee McNelly Davis, soprano; and Dr. Irving Friedman, tenor. High point of the Rosh Hashana services is the blowing of the shofar or ram's horn. The piercing sound produced by this instrument used in ancient days is remind worshipers of the story of Abraham and Isaac. God provided a ram whose horn was caught in a thicket to take Isaac's place as a sacrifice. The shofar will be blown by Marty Scott of Birmingham. Another symbol of the holiday is the special round bread (challah) which is dipped in honey to represent the sweetness and "roundness" of the coming year. As the congregation prays for God's blessing on them during the New Year, they also pray for peace and "sweetness" for all the people of the world.

The "Sabbath of Repentance" will be observed Friday, Oct. 2. This is the Sabbath which falls between Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement. SERVICES WILL be held at 8:30 p.m. The Bible reading, the same for Jews throughout the world, is from the Book of Hosea and begins "Return, O Israel unto the Lord your God."
