

## 3 FHS Students Place In Merit Tests


Principal James Geiger has announced that three students at Farmington High School have been named semi-finalists in the 1970-71 National Merit Scholarship program. They are Cheryl DeYoung, William Ingram and Richard Luky.

More than 700,000 students nationwide took the tests last February. Winners constitute less than one per cent of the

country's graduating seniors. About 96 per cent are expected to become finalists, and each will be considered for one of the 1,000 national merit \$1,000 scholarships which are allocated by state. Many will also be considered for the renewable four-year merit scholarships provided by corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, trusts, professional and other organizations.


