DOMESTIC CUTS — By a vote of 14 for and 83 against, the Senate re-buffed President Reagan and reject-ed an amendment to eliminate 43 domestle programs that his fiscal 1987 budget proposes killing at a savings of \$4 billion.

The senate's proposed budget recommends 1987 outlays of \$1,097 trillion, revenue of \$862.7 billion, and a defleit roughly equal to the \$144 billion figure mandated by the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings law.
