House bill is opposed

One provision of a federal House bill, which would require municipalities to send 1099 federal tax forms to property taxpayers, is opposed by the Farmington City Council.
Council members voted Monday, May 5, to unanimously oppose the measure, currently before the state Senate for consideration, at the request of Crion Township Supervisor Johan VanTatsol.
House Bill 3338 would require the municipality to send the 1099 form to taxpayers and to the federal Internal Revenius Service.
"The natural extension of this requirement would be to include a Social Security number or tax number of each taxpayer so information could be checked against the individual's federal tax return," a report to the council said.

All interested citizens are encouraged to attend and submit written or oral comments.

Last year (1985), the City levied \$8.4713 Mills (\$8.4713 per \$1,000 SEV) for City operations, City Charter limited debt and capital improvements. Due to an increase in the State Equalized Value of exist-

ing property in the City, State Law (Act 5 of 1982) provides that the base tax rate for 1986 city operating, City Charter limited debt and capital improvements taxes be reduced to \$8.1401 mills (\$8.1401 per \$1,000 SEV). This is \$.3312 Mills (\$.3312 per \$1,000 SEV) lower than the 1985 operating and capital tax rate

Presently, the City is authorized to levy \$9.8057 Mills

With the proposed addition of police personnel, increased operating and service costs, and the City's commitments to drainage, major street and other public facility improvements, the City may be required to raise additional revenues by increasing tax

for operating purposes.

City budget hearing is slated

A public hearing to review pro-posed 1986-87 revenues and expendi-tures, and to announce the city will continue the same millage rate without reduction for property value increases — was scheduled.

The hearing is set for 8 p.m. Monday, May 19, in council chambers at Farmington City Hall.


Although the city proposes to levy the same operational millinge rate in the coming budget year, it will not reduce the millage rate to reflect



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For these and other reasons in order to fund the City's proposed 1886-87 Budget and to maintain essential services, meet debt obligations, provide capital improvements, the City may find it necessary to levy additional millage of up to \$1.3850 Mills (\$1.3850 per \$1,000 SEV) above the 1985 base operating millage rate of \$6.1401 (\$8.1401 per \$1,000 SEV) and will levy unlimited debt millage of \$.2916 Mills (\$.2916 per \$1,000 SEV). This additional millage would be allocated for operations and for capital improvements per \$1,000 SEV)sThis additional millage would be allocated for operations and for capital improvements. This millage rate would provide an estimated increase of 17.0% in property tax revenues for operating purposes, debt service and capital improvements. Of this 17.0% increase, approximately 12.25% is attributable to the proposed \$1.00 Mill (\$1.00 per \$1,000 SEV) levy for major road improvements and 4.75% for operations and debt. The City has complete authority to establish the number of mills proposed to be levied from within its authorized
