
Students perform well in national musicfest

NOTICE OF A **PUBLIC HEARING** ON INCREASING PROPERTY TAXES

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on Tuesday, May 20, PLEASE TARE NOTICE that on Tuesday, May 29, 1986, at 7 o'clock p.m. at the Schulman Center, 32500 Shiawassee, the Board of Education of Farmington Public Schools will hold a public hearing on the levying in 1986 of an additional proposed millage rate of 1.8 mills (over the base tax rate) for operating purposes pursuant to Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan,

The maximum additional proposed millage rate would increase revenues for operating purposes from ad valorem property tax levies in 1986 otherwise permitted by Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1982, by approximately 5.8%.

Presently, the Farmington Board of Education is authorized to levy 36.5 mills for operating purposes. The recommendation for the 1986-87 levy is 32.5 mills, 4 mills less than the authorized millage. The amounts actually levied during the past several years are listed:

The purpose of the hearing is to receive testimony and discuss the levy of an additional millage rate. Not less than seven (7) days following the public hearing, the Board of Education may approve all or any portion of the proposed additional millage rate.

The Board of Education has proposed this millage in recognition of the responsibility to maintain and sustain an effective educational program for the community.
