OTSFORD INN'S sesquicen-tennial costume ball raised \$22,000 for Botsford Gener-al Hospital's new Family Services Center, an outpattent addi-tion recovery center stated to open

June 1.

"A seven-course dinner — replete with cookie pyramid centerpieces—was prepared from authentic 1800s récipes. Decorations and protocol also closely resembled an elegant dinner party set in the mid-19th century.

Innkeeper John Anhut was dressed as inn founder Orrin Weston might have been 150 years before. The inn is Michigan's oldest operating lodg-ing facility

The 215 guests were served cham-pigne and hors d'ocuvres in the inn's brick-pathed courtyard before being celled to several dining rooms.

AFTER DINNER, the Olde Michigan Ruffwater Stringband provided thematic music tracing the history of popular dance tunes from 1836.

Their greetings to ball great read, in part: "As a registered historical site, Botsford Inn makes an important contribution to our community as a keeper of the past. It offers us a vital, enduring reference point on our journey into the future.

"Not content to remain the past, however, the inn has folined in a partnership with its neighbor, Botsford General Hospital," the greetings continued.

"Together, they are lending sup-port to those living with chemical dependency, one of the most wide-spread health problems of modern times."



"By keeping patients in familiar surroundings and allowing them to meet their personal and professional obligations, we can build on the strengths of individuals and families to overcome abuse problems," reads a promotion for the new center.

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CENTER PROGRAMS will be aligned to meet individual needs—from intensive dully treatment to traditional support sessions, Some counseling sessions will be just for raditional support sessions, Some counseling sessions will be just for patients, others for patients and family members and still dithers for rough of patients sharing common goals.


All center services will be provided under the direct supervision of medical and nursing personnel with training and experience in the clinical management of the chemically dependent patient. Graduates may seek longer-term help through Al-coholics Anonymous, Al-Anon, Al-Ateen or Narcoles Anonymous.

The center also will provide out-reach programs on chemical dependency, on how addiction affects relationships, and on nutrition and wellness.
