A public hearing to review the proposed 1988-89 budget is scheduled first on the agenda for the regular council meeting. The city is proposing to levy the same millage rate as the previous year.

Also on the agenda is a proposed ordinance to the city's purchasing procedure. Currently, any items purchased over \$1,000 must be taken through a three-bid process with award going to the lowest bidder. The amendment would increase the amount of expenditure requiring competitive bidding from \$1,000 to \$4,000.

The council will also consider amendments to the 1985-86 budget, request for a taxicab license, appointments to boards and commissions and a request for installation of parking lot from the Big Boy Restaurant.


The district's Truth in Taxation and preliminary 1988-89 budget hearing will begin at 7 p.m.

The special meeting is a Truth-in-Taxation public hearing. The hearing is required because one mill in 1988-89 will generate about 4 percent more revenue than a mill did last year because the city's state equalized valuation (SEV) increased from \$1.1 billion to approximately \$1.2 billion. Residents may also comment on the city's proposed 1988-89 general fund and federal revenue sharing budgets.


