

# Identification Day

Y offers 2 suggestions for child's protection

Saturday, June 14, is "Identification Day" in Farmington. Area YMCA when Micro 1/Ds will be introduced to the community. The event is open for children 3-12 years old from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Y's multipurpose room on Farmington Road north of 12 Mile.

Law enforcement personnel, emergency and medical professionals will be on hand to explain their roles in helping to identify lost children and the two procedures offered that day that can mean the difference between a long uncertain wait for parents and a quick and certain identification. One procedure is the Micro 1/D. The other is an Identification Composite.

The Micro 1/D is a minuscule chip that is bonded to a child's tooth, most often a molar.

"Parents can have anything they want written on the chip, the child's name, nickname, phone numbers, any illnesses, blood type, religion, anything at all," said Pilar Droze, who is heading up the event for the Y. "And there is no pain, no anesthesia, when the chip is bonded to the tooth. It takes about 10 minutes."

A videotape of the bonding process is in the Y now. Parents are invited to bring their youngsters in at any time and request a showing.

Children who are already registered for a Micro 1/D will be having the process done by Dr. Gary J. Sinar, a Farmington Hills dentist who is volunteering his time identification day so newcomers can observe how the bonding is done. Children who register for the Micro 1/D that day will have the bonding done by their own dentist.

COST FOR the Micro 1/D is \$15, payable with registration. "And most dentists will bond the chip for little or nothing," Droze said. "We have a print out of all the dentists in Michigan who do this, which I think must

be all the dentists in Michigan. It takes about 10 days for the chip to be made."

"When the children lose their first tooth, or if an adult should lose the molar that has been bonded, the chip can be easily transferred to another tooth."

"Here again, anything you want to put into the composite can go into it: hobbies, friends, likes and dislikes, birth marks, bike routes, relatives, doctor's names and numbers. The police will help you write up all the things they need to know that will help them help you," Droze said.

paired, persons with Alzheimer's disease, anyone who could get lost or be in a position not to be able to speak for himself.

"It won't be long before checking persons of all ages for Micro 1/Ds will become standard procedures with the police. In emergency rooms," she said.

Droze described the Identification Composite as "much more than a fingerprint and a photo."

Farmington Hills Police will help parents make up the composite for each of their children that will, in effect, be a complete scenario of the child's habits as well as physical makeup.

Cost for the composite is \$3. The composite is stored in a safety deposit box and turned over to the authorities if needed.

There is no charge to visit the Y on Identification Day, watch the Micro 1/Ds being bonded, hear the presentations, or ask questions.

Preparations for production of the second annual "Tri-County Women's Yellow Pages" are underway. The directory will be collecting advertisements and listings from women in Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties from now until July 1, with publication scheduled for the fall.

The directory is a listing of women in business, professions and services providing a way for women in the Tri-County area to network with one another.

The directory also provides an excellent medium for reaching women consumers who, according to a recent Wall Street Journal article, "make many of the buying decisions in two income households."

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## Pastor's son assists in workshop service

Thomas R. Marcis Jr. will deliver the message during the 8:15 and 10:45 Worship Services Sunday, June 15, in Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, located on the corner of 12 Mile and New Market roads east of Farmington Road. His father, Pastor of the congregation, will assist as liturgist.

Last month Marcis completed his studies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Mo., where he received his master of divinity degree and theological diploma. He was one of 113 graduates. His call is to serve as pastor of St. Luke Lutheran Church in Zap, N.D., approximately 70 miles northwest of Bismark, the state's capital. Prior to his enrollment at the seminary, candidate Marcis attended Concordia College in Ann Arbor where he received his bachelor of arts degree.

In 1980 Marcis was married to Sara Hessler from the Grand Rapids area. They have one son, Richard, age 4. On Sunday, July 6, he will be ordained into the office of the holy ministry and installed as pastor of St. Luke congregation in Zap.

Prior to his installation and ordination, a service of "Farewell and Goodspeed" will be conducted at Royal Redeemer Lutheran Church, North Royalton, Ohio where he and his wife currently hold their membership. This will take place on Sunday, June 22. The Rev. T. Richard Marcis Sr., Pastor at Prince of Peace, will deliver the special message on that day.
