"It won't be long before checking persons of all ages for Micro/IDs will become standard procedures with the police. In emergency rooms," she said.

Droze described the Identification Composite as "much more than a flagorprint and up hoto."

"Here again, anything you want to put into the composite can go into it; habbies, friends, likes and dislikes, birth marks, bike routes, relatives, doctor's names and numbers. The police will help you write up all the things they need to know that will help them help you." Droze said.

Cost for the composite is \$9. The composite is stored in a safety deposit box and turned over to the authorities if needed.

There is no charge to visit the Y on Identification Day, watch the Micro/ID's being bonded, hear the presentations, or ask questions.
