

Fire Loss Lower

More than \$10,800 in buildings and furnishings have been destroyed this year in 72 fires reported to the City of Farmington Department of Public Safety.

Chief Robert Deadman, who reviewed the 1967 state fire loss report, said:

"Although we have had more fires than last year, the total loss is far below the \$30,700 for 1967."

Residents reported 81 fires and one false alarm in 1967.

The largest single cause was reported to be solid fuels in heating systems, ranges and boilers. Fifteen were reported. Defective electrical appliances caused 13 fires, while careless smoking resulted in seven.

Causes of the remaining fires ranged from one started by a juvenile to four from careless rubbish burning.

No fatalities resulting from fires were reported.

For the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said Township, City or Village as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such, shall enter at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

The township office will be open all day the Saturday prior to close of registrations.

ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Township, City or Village in which he is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designates his title.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, City or Village in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P.A. 1954.)

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved there, and the address from which he was last registered or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made after the Fifth Friday next preceding any election or primary election, (unless such transfers are made on a legal holiday in which event registration shall be accepted during the next full working day).

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon upon his signature, and send it to the Clerk at least one day prior to the election at the next ensuing primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registration office shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify the transfer and file it in the precinct file. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote entitled to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall file the application with the registration records in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.
