COM-ON-A-WONNA — Nature lovers ages 6-12 may attend Com-on-a-Wonna Camp. Concentrating on educational and recreational programming in a natural setting, Com-on-a-Wonna Camp is at Heritage Park this year.

Campers study animal life, insects, plant life, geology, camp craft, fishing and archery. Camp fire programs, fishing and field trips are also planned. One-week sessions are June 23-27, June 30-July 3, July 7-11, July 14-18, July 21-25, July 28-Aug. 1 and Aug. 4-8.

Camp meets every day from 9:30 a.m. through 3:30 p.m. except Thursdays (2 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.), which include a special family camp fire. Fee for Com-on-a-Wonna Camp is \$34 a session.

DISCOUNT TICKETS — A variety of admission tickets at a discount to residents are offered through the Farmington Hills Department of Special Services in cooperation with

the Michigan Recreation and Park Association. Tickets to such attractions as Bobo Island, Cedar Point, Crossroads Village and many more are all available.

Tickets are on sale at the city of Farmington Hills' Recreation Division office and the City of Farmington's Finance Department through Sept. 2.

SWIMMING LESSONS — Three sessions of swimming instruction are available for beginner through advanced swimmers. Classes are Monday-Thursday in two-week sessions at Farmington and North Farmington High Schools.

Sessions are June 23-July 3, July 7-17 and July 21-31. Class participants must be 38 inches tall at their chin height.

Pre-registration is necessary and handled on a first-come first-served basis through the recreation office. Fee for each session is \$22.

LEARNING DISABLED — Designed to enhance proper behavior skills and to help develop fine/gross motor skills in a social atmosphere, this new camp program provides a setting for learning disabled children. Camp is at Oakland Community College in Building B, Mondays through Thursdays, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Participants ages 6-13 are eligible.

Learning Disabled Camp is available in three sessions, June 23-July 3 (ages 9-13), July 7-17 (ages 6-9) and July 21-31 (ages 9-13). Fee for each session is \$70.

OPEN SWIM — From June 23 through July 31, Monday through Thursday, open swim takes place at North Farmington High School from 1-3 p.m.

Fee is \$1 per person at the door or you may buy tickets in advance from the recreation office (10 tickets for \$8).

Cutoffs are not permitted and swimmers whose chin height is less than 38 inches must be accompanied by a parent.

JUNIOR GOLF LEAGUE — Junior Golf League for participants

ages 12-14 or 15-16 begins July 7, Mondays and Fridays, at the city's San Marino Golf Course. A seven-match league schedule is followed. Fee for league participation is \$28.

Participants compete against their entire division and are eligible to play in the Northwest Parks and Recreation Junior Golf Tournament later in the summer.

PICNIC PACS — Picnic pacs sporting a volleyball and net, a complete badminton set, a softball bat and ball, scoops and whiffle balls, horseshoes and stakes and Frisbees are available for family reunions or group picnics.

Picnic pacs must be reserved one week in advance through the recreation office. Fees are \$8 per week or \$5 per day.

A croquet set is also available for \$3 per weekend or \$2 per day. A \$20 deposit is required at time of pickup.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING JUNE 23, 1986

Mayor Alkateeb opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council on June 23, 1986 at 7:30 p.m. Members present: Alkateeb, Dolan, Dudley, Marka, Sever, Sorensen, and Wolf. Others present: City Manager Costick, City Clerk Reynolds, and City Attorney Ribben.

Minutes of June 2, 1986 and June 9, 1986 were approved as amended.

Council adopted EDC Resolution No. 4, approving the project plan for Wilgreen Building Green project.

Council adopted EDC Resolution No. 4, approving the project plan for Midwest Development Company project.

Ordinance No. C-24-86, Zoning Request 9-3-86, was Enacted, to rezone property at 3245 Northwest Boulevard from RA-1 to B-3 and P-1.

Ordinance No. C-25-86, Zoning Request 10-3-86, was Enacted, to rezone .0763 acres of land at northeast corner of Nine Mile and Middlebelt from B-1 to B-3.

Ordinance No. C-26-86, Zoning Request 11-3-86, was Enacted, to rezone property at 3308 W. Eight Mile Road from RA-3 to C-2.

Ordinance No. C-27-86, Zoning Request 12-3-86, was Enacted, to rezone 9.08 acres of land on east side of Haggerty, between Nine and Ten Mile Roads from RA-2 to C-2.

Council approved an Administrative Order on Ordinance No. C-25-86, which will allow building and construction activity on Sundays and legal holidays for homeowners on private property.

Council approved agreement with Tony DeFedeiro of Italia-American Builders for completion of open space in Meadowbrook Park Subdivision and approved agreement allowing other builders in subdivision to proceed with construction, contingent upon the open space being completed by Mr. DeFedeiro within 45 days.

Council referred to staff proposed revised subdivision open space completion policy and directed staff to prepare amendment to Ordinance and set date for public hearing.

Council introduced Ordinance authorizing City personnel to write court appearance tickets.

Council adopted S.A.D. Resolution No. 1, establishing boundaries of the special assessment district for Lakeland Drive and Fairway Hills Drive and adopted S.A.D. Resolution No. 2, establishing the date of July 21, 1986 for public hearing. Fireworks permit was approved for Farmington Founders Festival on July 19, 1986.

Parade permit was approved for Farmington Founders Festival on July 19, 1986.

Council adopted Resolution consenting to transfer of employment of fourteen employees of American Dealer Accessories Division of Durakon Industries, at 24569 Hallwood Court, to a new facility in Westland, Michigan.

Special Council meeting was set for June 24, 1986 at 8:00 p.m. to confirm results of Parks and Recreation Special Election of June 24, 1986.

Request for executive session following meeting was approved to discuss land acquisition and pending litigation.

Council adopted S.A.D. Resolution No. 4, setting date of July 21, 1986 for road improvement on Thirteen Mile Road east bearing.

Council adopted S.A.D. Resolution No. 1, establishing the proposed paving district for Goldsmith Street and adopted S.A.D. Resolution No. 2, setting the date of July 14, 1986 for public hearing.

Resolution was adopted authorizing issuance of purchase order to Albin Business Copiers of Farmington Hills for copy equipment system for Police Department in amount of \$19,204.

Resolution was adopted authorizing procurement of filing equipment for Assessing Department from J.R. & Company in amount of \$4,773.60.

Resolution was adopted authorizing procurement of dump truck for Department of Public Services from Motor City Ford Trucks, Inc., Livonia, Michigan, in amount of \$42,618.28; Do-It dump/greaser box from Miller Equipment, Inc., Livonia, Michigan, in amount of \$11,530; and installation of truck's plow mounts and hydraulic systems from Shulte Equipment Inc., Ithaca, Michigan, in amount of \$4,471.

Resolution was adopted authorizing purchase of office equipment and furniture for new Police Building from Silvers of Southfield (\$8,309), J.R. & Company of Farmington Hills (\$5,896), and Radford Office Products (\$3,395).

Resolution was adopted authorizing purchase of traffic counters for Engineering Department from Ash Instrumentation in amount of \$15,740.

Tri-Party Agreement was entered into with Oakland County Road Commission for Orchard Lake Road paving at estimated cost to the City of \$71,603.

Notice of Intent to Proceed as a Public Safety Answering Point for Oakland County 911 Program was adopted.

Council approved employment of David Burton as Video Production Assistant in Department of Special Services, Jeffrey A. Mobley as Southland Scorekeeper, and Donnie Pollard, Learning Disabled Camp Assistant in Department of Special Services, in accordance with Article X, Section 10.01 A of the City Charter.

Discussion was held regarding Mobile Home Parks relative to financing program for demolition and other improvements.
