Poll shows sales, marketing jobs level off

A new national opinion poll indi-cates that sales and marketing em-ployment in the North Central re-gion including Farmington Hills will level slightly for the second half of

glon including Farmington Hills will level slightly for the second half of 1986.

Tha survey, conducted by Sales Consullants International, the country's largest search firm of asles and marketling professionals, asked over 1,400 executives in companies across the country to project their hirlings of the country to project their hirlings has for the next six months. A total of 37.4 percent of the surveyed in the North Central area indicated they were planning to expand their sales and marketing staffs during the next six months. Another 51.1 percent in the region said they would maintain present staff levels and 10.6 percent planned staff reductions. This is a 3.2 point increase among those who planned to reduce staffs.

By comparison, 40.7 percent of

By comparison, 40.7 percent of those polled throughout the country

were planning to increase staff size: 47.8 percent said they would maintain staff size; and 10.6 percent indicated possible staff reductions.
