Livonia Adray moved into a tie for first place in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League with a 5-8 victory over co-leader Redford Little Caesars in a game played Wednesday at Ford Field.

The two teams, who met yesterday in a LCBF double-header, are both 13-6-1.

Winning pitcher Don Vesting ran his record to 5-0 with the victory. The Eastern Michigan University standout scattered eight hits to go along with 10 strikeouts.

Scott Wellers's two-run single, spearheading a three-run second inning, lifted the Livonians to a 4-1 advantage, a lead they never relinquished.

ty, to help defuse problems before they start."

At about this time in our conversation that I began to realize Roberts' approach to the executive directorship would differ from Norris. Norris always portrayed himself as merely an enforcer of rules, never as a policy-maker. It appears Roberts will be more visible, more dynamic, more of a leader.

Such is the hope — certainly that is what's needed — at the least. But there's more to Roberts than a proclivity for leadership.

An experience factor that may have weighed heavily in his hiring was his past work as chief executive officer for Ruedinger Co's. While employed in that capacity, Roberts worked to develop a liability insurance package for state athletic associations that were members of the national association.

LIABILITY INSURANCE could

be the greatest threat facing high school sports programs in the next decade. Already, prep coaches believe such sports as diving and gymnastics, and the pole vault in boys track, are doomed to extinction because of rising insurance costs.

Roberts' experience in this field could make a major difference. "Many of our sports are in jeopardy," he admitted. "The solution is for the national purchasing group to handle individual school districts, to provide special protection that will cover individual districts."

It will take time and work, Roberts realizes, and he is willing to contribute.

"I think, because of my background, I could be of assistance," he said. "I'll happily take a leadership role if I need be."

Leadership? An MHSAA executive director offering to step to the forefront, to establish goals and make policy?

That will be a change.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills City Council will give formal consideration to proposed text amendments of the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 60, Zoning Chapter, which amendments and their section numbers read as follows:

1. Amendment to Section 60.2201 (A). This proposal will change the current footnote to add a 10 foot landscape buffer.
2. Amendment to Section 60.2200 and 2201 Footnote (w). This proposal will add footnote (w) to the Schedule of Regulations which would require a minimum 10 foot landscape area abutting a street.
3. Amendment to Section 60.2317 Landscaping. This proposal will add the requirement for landscaped lands for certain parking lots. In addition, a section will be added to provide a landscape buffer between RC-Districts and RA-Districts.
4. Amendment to Section 60.2305 Off Street Parking Space Layout, Standards, Construction and Maintenance. This proposal will add paragraph 16. See Section 60.2317 B. Landscaping for required canopy trees in parking lots.
5. Amendment to Section 60.504 D. Regulations Limiting Height, Bulk, Density and Area by Land Use. This proposal will add to Paragraph D. See also Section 60.2317 C. Landscaping for Buffer yard requirements.
6. Amendment to Section 60.503 Required Conditions in the RC-District. This proposal will add Paragraph 8. See Section 60.2317 C. Landscaping for Buffer yard requirements.
7. Amendment to Section 60.2317 Landscaping. This proposal will add the requirement that a planting plan be prepared by a landscape architect.
8. Add to Section 60.2317, Landscaping the following paragraph B.
B. Landscaped areas and plant materials required by this ordinance shall be kept free from refuse and debris. Plant materials, including lawns, shall be maintained in a healthy, growing condition, neat and orderly in appearance. If any plant materials required by this ordinance die or become diseased, they shall be replaced.

Any person who is interested in this amendment is invited to attend and participate in the public hearing discussion. Complete Zoning Chapter, text and maps are available for purchase and/or inspection during regular business hours at the City Clerk's Office.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The City of Farmington Hills 1986 Summer Tax Statements are due July 1, 1986. This statement includes city taxes, community college taxes, one-half of the school taxes, and special assessments (if applicable). The entire amount of the 1986 Summer Tax Statement is payable from July 1, 1986 through August 31, 1986 without penalty. Payments can be made at City Hall. The Treasurer's Office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., with the exception of July 4th CLOSED ALL DAY.

For the taxpayer's convenience, a right depository, located on the EAST WALL OF THE FRONT COURTYARD is available for after hours tax payments. Also, tax payments can be made at the following banks during regular business hours:

- National Bank of Detroit (15¢ fee charged by NBD for each bill)
- Michigan National Bank of Detroit (no fee charged)
- Michigan National Bank of Farmington (no fee charged)
- Michigan National Bank of Novi (no fee charged)
- Manufacturers Bank of Detroit (no fee charged)

By law, payments received by mail are recorded on the date actually by the Treasurer. Payments received after August 31, 1986 will be considered a partial payment, and penalty bills will be mailed out.

A 4% penalty will be added on September 1, 1986, plus 1/4% per month interest on the unpaid balance. The banks cannot accept payment of delinquent tax bills.

Summer taxes may be deferred until February 17, 1987 by a senior citizen, paraplegic, quadriplegic, blind person, permanently disabled person, eligible serviceman, veteran or widow. Qualified persons can obtain application forms at the Treasurer's Office by bringing in tax bill and social security card.

As of March 3, 1987 all delinquent taxes and penalty bills will be turned over to Oakland County, and no longer payable at City Hall. Payments are made to C. Hugh Dobay, Oakland County Treasurer, with their 4% collection fee plus current interest rate.
