Auto Strike May Hurt Students

The current strike in the automotive industry, if prolonged, may add to the many factors leading to greater financial need among students, says Ronald M. Brown, director of the Office of Student Financial Aid at The University of Michigan.

This is another reflection of the fact that today's student needs are increasingly being influenced by the shift in the socio-economic background of the student population.

"Ten years ago," says Brown, "we were dealing primarily with middle class and upper class whites. Now we are working more and more with disadvantaged students."

Brown admits that the traditional criteria for administering aid have proven inadequate, and acceptable new criteria seem slow to come.

HE EXPLAINS that the increase in student financial need has two dimensions to it. First, the number of applications for aid has risen.

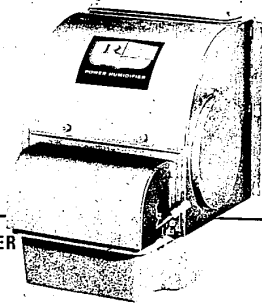
