

# C'ville school chief gets pay increase

Clarenceville superintendent Michael Shihler will earn \$3,700 more in the 1986-87 school year than he did the previous year.

The Clarenceville Board of Education has approved the superintendent's salary as \$55,000 for the 1986-87 school year, with a tax-sheltered

annuity of \$3,000 and a one-year extension on the current contract. All fringe benefits will stay the same.

Clarenceville includes parts of

Livonia, Redford and Farmington Hills. The district's total student enrollment last year was just over 2,000.

Shihler's salary was \$47,500 when he was named superintendent two years ago, and went up to \$51,300 last year. He was originally hired for three years, from July 1984 through June 1987.

ALSO, THE school board has

approved the salary of Rose Govig, building principal at Ten Mile School and manager of the adult education program, by \$14,000. Her new salary total is almost \$40,600. It is now in effect, retroactive to July 1.

Govig has been paid for the last

two years according to the teacher's salary schedule, her years of service and degree, said Patricia Vickery, administrative assistant for instruction.

She said Govig first was paid

\$19,000 as a part-time employee, and then approximately \$26,000 full

time.

District teachers at the top of the

master's salary schedule now earn

\$186 a day. With the adjusted salary,

Govig will be paid this amount multi-

plied by 218, the number of days

Govig's pay will be subject to adjustment as the new teacher salary schedule is set.

The new schedule will be set after the "fourth Friday" enrollment

count at the beginning of the school

year.

Clarenceville will receive some \$10,000 from the state as partial reimbursement for a full-time community education manager.

"Needless to say, her (positions) require many hours and a great deal of responsibility," Vickery wrote, in recommending the salary increase to the board.

Clarenceville's adult education

program had a total enrollment of

526 people last year. The program

offers both academic and leisure-

time programs. Its services include

career counseling, graduate equival-

ent diploma exams, classes in Eng-

lish as a second language and voca-

tional opportunities.
