Krumm is pride of Bloomfield

Now, let's see. I asked myself, how can I get a different angle on the Todd Krumm story?

His picture was plastered in full color on the front page of each of the daily newspapers. He was interviewed by every television and radio station in town. Heck, he even showed up on ESPN's late-evening highlights.

That's what happens when you're the hero of a college game against arguably the country's most famed football institution.

By now, everyone must know Krumm intercepted two passes against Notre Dame Saturday in East Lansing — one of which he turned into a MSU touchdown and the other stopping a late-game Irish drive.

He even earned national recognition being named "Midwest Player of the Week" by both the Associated Press and the United Press International after leading Michigan State to a 20-15 victory.

The West Bloomfield High School graduate received so much publicity he'll probably have to start another scrapbook, and the season's only two games old.

KRUMM TOLD his story to everyone. So, I wondered again, how could I offer readers a different perspective?

Then it hit me.

Domestic Livedoti.

Krumm played prep football for Livedoti. The veteran coach loves talking football and probably wouldn't hesitate to ramble about Todd Krumm.

I was right. He talked and talked, and I scribbled and scribbled. I couldn't write notes fast enough.

But a funny thing was happening. I wasn't jotting notes about Todd Krumm, the football player. Livedoti didn't mention any of Krumm's on-field efforts until halfway through our conversation.

Instead he chose to talk about the individual.

Todd Krumm, Livedoti said, is a person the township of West Bloomfield can truly be proud of. Livedoti said West Bloomfield couldn't have a better representative in a major college football program.

Livedoti was there in person. He saw Todd's efforts from around the 45-yard line. And he met Krumm after the game to offer his congratulations.

"AND YOU know what he told me?" said Livedoti. "He said he was lucky. But that's the kind of kid he is. He's modest. I think that's what made me most proud . . . to see the kind of game he had and to have him say he was just very fortunate to be in the right place at the right time."

"The fact is, though, he was there and he's the type of kid who could react to it," he said. "They were really big plays."

Livedoti said Krumm was amazed at all the publicity he received.

"He told me that now he realizes what (Heisman Trophy candidate and MSU teammate) Lorenzo White goes through every week with all the interviews he had. But, you know what, I talked with him after the game and he wasn't any different than the first time I met him coming into West Bloomfield High School as a freshman."

"I thought back to the first time I met Todd Krumm. He was a kid who had some character. I thought at that time that he was a kid who could never lose sight of what he could be."

"He's put West Bloomfield in the limelight," he said. "It's exciting."

KAYETTE JONES scored 37 to pace Saginaw. Pattie Davis added 20.

"It is important to keep this game in perspective," Baker said. "Saginaw obtained a No. 1 ranking based on their win against us. Who are we? We're a team that has come together quickly and has shown itself to be a force to be reckoned with. And now we face another absolute top team in the state. I think it's going to be fun. It's much better playing the Saginaws and Sals than loading up on the weaker teams."

Salem is led by junior Dena Head. She has scored better than 20 points in three of Salem's five games. But the Rocks are far from a one-person attack. Kristen Hostynski, Jessica Handley, Jill Estey and Keri McBride have also given Fred Thiemann's team steady contributions.
