

# Capitalize on fall's great colors

Summer is finally gone and exciting fall scenes await your camera. Fall colors are truly a painter's palette and you with your camera become the artist.

As the fall color change creeps gently southward, an abundance of photographic opportunities open up. Miles of roads, trails and streams will display rainbows of color, and area parks will be alive with vibrant hues.

Here's how you can capture this color spectacle on film.

Try shooting in early morning or late afternoon to produce maximum shadows and textures that will make your shots look more "alive." Try to position yourself to achieve back or side lighting, too.

Remember that a wide angle lens will give greater expanse to your shot whereas a telephoto will move you in close to isolate a particular dramatic tree or capture a splash of color in a cluster of fallen leaves.

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WITH CLOSE-UP equipment you will be able to highlight the veins in an individual leaf or catch small details for a very intimate shot.

You'll find that color-slide film will produce the most vivid colors. And by setting the film speed slightly higher than recommended (about 1/4 to 1/2 stop), you'll further increase color brilliance and saturation.

Don't overlook black and white film. Under an overcast sky, the contrasts and tones of fall colors will produce very exciting photographs with a full tonal range.

As always, follow good rules of composition. If your shot contains a

main subject, place it off-center to make the overall image appear more dynamic. "Frame" your pictures with overhanging branches or other foliage. Use roads, fences and streams as "lead-in lines" to help direct attention to your main subject.

Be aware of other fall picture-taking opportunities, too. Cider mills in operation, football games, that old dilapidated barn, even a patch of pumpkins are full of photographic potential.

For a few dollars I bought pumpkins, gourds and Indian corn for a fall still-life arrangement to photograph.

So get your cameras loaded up and shift your photographic vision into high gear. No better time of year exists for memorable shots for your picture album.
